Planning the first draft

Here are some things to consider as you work toward a draft of your essay. You don't really have to do them in order, although in general, research consists of a series of steps where basic elements lead to more complex ideas.

Do I have a concrete topic, or a real-world situation that I can read about?
What is interesting, unexpected or novel about this topic?
Do I have an open-ended, debatable, 'why' question about this topic?
Why is this question debatable? How many different possible answers are there?
Do I have an answer to this question, a thesis statement or claim I can defend?
What are some of the key facts about this topic? What are some my key examples?
What conclusions can I draw from these examples?
What is the basis (or warrant) on which I can may to a higger conclusion in these examples?
What is the basis (or warrant) on which I can move to a bigger conclusion in these examples?
Do I have reliable, factual and relevant sources of information?
Do I have complete, correct bibliographic information for each source?
